Course Description and Objectives:

In this course, we will learn how to become more effective writers. In order to accomplish this lofty goal, we will focus on all aspects of the writing process, with a particular focus on methods of revision. Be prepared to step out of your comfort zone. We will be looking at writing and the world around us, in ways that may be entirely new to you.

Grading:

To receive a grade in this class, you must complete five major writing assignments as well as any assigned homework, in-class work, or online course work, which may include such things as quizzes, written responses to reading, and/or grammar and usage worksheets.

Each essay assignment will go through a rigorous process of drafts and revision that will include peer workshops prior to formal grading. **If workshop drafts are late, incomplete, or partial, one letter grade will be deducted from the assignment**. For certain essay assignments, you will be required to attend individual conferences with me to discuss your first draft and offer editorial suggestions for revision. It is your responsibility to keep your graded assignments until the end of the course. Please also keep electronic backups of all your assignments.

Participation will be based on attendance, preparedness, and how you interact with your peers and your instructor—which must always be with a spirit of respect and helpfulness. You will receive an update of your participation grade twice during the semester.

Revision Portfolio is a collection of all the work you do leading up to your final drafts. You should keep hard copies of this work as well as electronic copies (so you should save outlines, notes, and various drafts under different names). You are responsible for keeping these materials so they can be presented at the end of the semester.

Papers will go through a process of note-taking, research and reading, organizing, and various drafting stages, including some earlier stages that are to generate ideas and other later stages that are to refine and polish your papers.

Internet Certain websites, most notably Moodle and Voxopop.com will be crucial to our work this semester. You should familiarize yourself with these Web 2.0 tools now, because technological failure is not a valid excuse for late work.

Plassmann Writing Center:

You will receive a one third letter grade bonus on the grade of each course essay that you workshop at the Writing Center in the basement of Plassmann Hall. There is a sign-up sheet on the door of the Center and, while occasional walk-in appointments may be available, you will likely want to sign up for an appointment ahead of time. You must drop off a copy of your essay in advance or bring it with you when you come to your appointment. You are welcome to attend the Writing Center more than once for any essay, but additional visits will not further increase your grade.

Attendance:

Every absence after 3 will equate to a 1% deduction from the final grade. Do not be late to class. It is a common courtesy to all, and tardiness will not be tolerated. Note that if you are more than 15 minutes late to class, you will be marked as absent. If attendance is influenced by hospitalization, family emergencies, or religious holidays, please contact me as soon as possible. Please note that you are responsible for making up any work that was missed during your absence from class. Please shut off all cell phones, mp3 players, beepers, and other electronic gizmos and place them safely out of sight. Perceived use f these devices in class will result in an absence. If your paper is late, you will lose one letter grade per day until it is turned in. Papers are due during the first half-hour of class of the due date. Again, rough drafts also have specific due dates and must be turned in on time. A late rough draft will cost you a letter grade on your final paper grade. If you are absent when a rough draft or final paper is due, the paper must still meet the deadline or suffer the penalty of being late.

All papers should be typed and printed in clean copy. **Unless otherwise noted by the instructor, electronic submission of papers will not be accepted**. Follow all MLA guidelines for paper formats, i.e. use a standard font (Garamond, Times New Roman, etc.), type in 12 point, and double-space the paper. Papers should have a heading in the upper left hand corner that includes your name, my name, course and section number, and assignment description (e.g. Paper 1 first draft etc.)
